

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

THE OPRAH WINFREY INTERVIEW

Give people the Oprah they know



CANDID: "The coming of me has been in the making for a long time," Oprah says, of her idea of belonging.

prah Winfrey guides you into her office and, after a welcoming hug (Winfrey's a hugger, but you probably already knew that), she immediately anticipates where your eye is going to land first. Over in the corner, overlooking her Oprah Winfrey Network studio lot, there's artist Whitfield Lovell's *Having*, a charcoal on wood panel image of two African American women that has three wood boxes of pennies placed in front of it.

"These women were early entrepreneurs," Winfrey says. "I looked at this every day from my desk in Chicago to remind me and inspire me that, yes, it can be done." The spacious West Hollywood office contains scores of Emmys (not all of them), shelves and shelves of books, many dotted with framed photos of Winfrey with the likes of Barack Obama and Nelson Mandela. Everything here has a story, and Winfrey, a consummate teller of tales, her own and others; will happily share them with gusto.

"You see that photograph of me and Madiba over there?" Winfrey says, pointing to a picture of her and Mandela, telling of the time she went to South Africa to help Aidsstricken children for a project called Christmas Kindness. Once there, Winfrey, her hair braided, waited with a town mayor for Mandela to arrive via helicopter.

"I am so excited," the mayor told her. "Nelson Mandela is coming and he's bringing Oprah Winfrey from America." Winfrey looked at him, confused. "I'm already here," she told him. "I'm Oprah." The mayor looked at her. "You? You look like a girl from the village.

Where is the Oprah we know?" Winfrey laughs, but it's not enough to stir her beloved cocker spaniel, Sadie, sprawled out on the sofa next to her. It's a good story. And, of course, for Winfrey it's not just a story but a lesson because Winfrey finds lessons everywhere, and she absorbs them and then passes them on because she loves, to use a word she adores, "pontificating."

The town mayor's lesson: Rise for the moment. Give people the Oprah they know.

Over a long, discursive conversation, Winfrey, 63, did just that, touching on the movie she just made for HBO, *The Immortal Life* of *Henrietta Lacks*, in which she plays Deborah, the daughter of the title character, an African American woman whose cancer cells became crucial to medical research. We also talked about her next movie, *A Wrinkle in Time*, made with her friend, Ava DuVernay, who created the beautiful, character-driven drama *Queen Sugar* for OWN. And other movies too, ones that Winfrey has made, might one day make, as well as films dear to heart.

Deborah is searching for her identity through finding out about her mother. Did playing her make you think about your half-sister, Patricia, and what it was like for her to find you and your mother after so many years?

You're the only person who's ever brought that up! But you are right. I thought of her a lot. There's a line where Deborah says, "The only thing I care about is my mother and my sister." I know that my sister has said those words.

Her longing for family

informed your work? Definitely. That was part of my process. Because I don't have that longing. I'm the exact opposite. Like, probably when I was 20-something, I was told by a cousin that my father wasn't my father. And I said, "The only father I have is Vernon Winfrey and he's in a barber shop in Nashville, Tenn." And if somebody who said they were my father came to my front door, it would not matter to me.

I don't have any of that longing to know. Partly because I just do have this deeper sense of belonging to something bigger than my parents. Because my parents were together

only one time. So it wasn't like, "Oh, gee, we wanted this daughter." (Laughs)

I'm glad my father did lay claim to me when he didn't have to. And I'm glad my mother didn't abort me because it would have been easier to do as a poor coloured woman with no education in Mississippi. So I'm grateful for that, but I don't feel this deep sense of belonging to them. I think I belong to something bigger. The coming of me has been in the making for a long time.

You're talking generations. I never read it thoroughly when it was done, but I just recently looked at Henry Louis Gates' book, Finding Oprah's Roots. Looking at it, I am a descendant of not just slaves, but slaves who loved land, which I now have a thing about land. I like it better than shoes. I'd rather have a nice piece of land than a great pair of shoes!

The fact that my great-greatgrandfather could come out of slavery and end up a land owner, my great-great-grandmother would come out of slavery and end up a teacher and built a little school on a property ... and I had this yearning to build a school for girls. That's what I mean: It all comes from something bigger. Deeper.

Going back to Deborah and the movie ... if you made that connection with your half sister, why did you have so many reservations about taking the part?

I always have reservations about acting. I don't want to embarrass myself

But you've acted in movies directed by Steven Spielberg and Jonathan Demme and Ava DuVernay...

I started with Spielberg. So I started pretty high in the food chain.

And you've said that you were terrified every day he was going to fire you on The Color Purple.

I was terrified. There was another movie - was it Mask? - where somebody had recently been fired, and it had never occurred to me that you could be fired from a movie. But I did know that if there was anybody who could be fired, it would be me, because I didn't know what I was doing. Period.

My first day on set and I am in the first scene and I walk in and look directly into the camera and say my line. "Cut! Cut!" Steven asked, "Why are looking into the camera?" I had been on TV since I was 19 and that's what you do. You look at the camera. Anyway, I learned. But I've never stopped being intimidated.

What about acting for Ava in A Wrinkle in Time?

Well, that was different. That was just a fun thing to do. I'm so proud of her. You know why? Because it mirrors my relationship with Maya Angelou. She used to tell me she was proud of me, but I couldn't hear it. I couldn't receive it. I didn't really know what that meant until my friendship with Ava. Every time she does something, I think, "Oh. This



the village. Where is the Oprah we know?" is what Maya felt about me. That's what it means when you feel enlarged by someone else's successes." Her growth makes me feel broader.

Tell me about Mrs. Witch, your character in A Wrinkle in Time.

She's a cross between Glinda the Good Witch and Maya Angelou. (Laughs)

You know, it all started because I love New Zealand so much. So when Ava went there to scout and she's telling me about the ice caves and glaciers and mountains and turquoise lakes, I told her, "I am coming to visit." And she said, "If you're going to visit, why don't you work? Would you mind reading the script?"

So I did. And I believe I am Mrs. Witch! You know, she's born of

the stars and she's a wise woman coming from another cosmos. So, c'mon! And she loves pontificating.

The mayor looked at her. "You? You look like a girl from

Next thing you're going to say is that she loves desserts and Toni Morrison.

She probably does! Anyway, it was done out of friendship in the beginning and turned into a great experience. I just saw it in its rough stages the other day, just a piece of it, and I started to cry. She's put her soul into it. And Disney has given her the luxury of time, which she has never had before. It's going to pay off in ways you can't imagine.

"It's going to pay off in ways you can't imagine," Oprah Winfrey says of the time Disney gave her friend and director Ava DuVernay to make A Wrinkle in Time.

(In an e-mail, DuVernay writes:

"This is my second time working with Oprah as an actress. The first was with her poignant portrayal of the real-life civil rights legend Annie Lee Cooper in Selma. This time around we worked together on her portrayal of an all-knowing, all-wise celestial being who brings good and light to the Universe. Tall order for most. But she dazzled me and everyone on set with the ease and effortlessness of her performance. It's saying a lot when you can make all-knowing and all-wise look easy! But she did just that.

"Oprah is a lot of things. Leader. Legend. Mogul. But we should really add a formidable actress to that list. She has a tremendous toolbox. I believe her work as an actor is imbued with the knowledge of all her hundreds of thousands of human interactions and interviews

over the past three decades. She's looked into people's eyes and heard their stories face to face. The triumphs. The tragedies. And everything in between. She's heard and seen it all. And she brings that to her acting. Because she's achieved excellence in her career in other areas, it's easy to overlook her acting work. But when you really look closely, it's quite clear. She's a real actor with real gifts. A force. And I consider myself fortunate to have worked with her in this way.")

What about this talk of you playing the Shirley MacLaine role in Lee Daniels' remake of Terms of Endearment? Is that going to happen?

It's just a rumour. I spoke to Lee actually this morning who told me that somebody is writing it. And I go, "Lee, you're not doing a thing until you have a script." And I don't think it should be called Terms of Endearment, that's for sure, especially if you're doing a whole other script. It's about an African American family and the girl gets Aids from the husband. That's not Terms of Endearment. It's something else.

So you're not stepping into Shirley MacLaine's shoes?

What I am saying for sure is that I am not going to try to step into Shirley MacLaine's shoes. It's unnecessary to do that. She's already done it as well as it could be done for that role.

I just watched Terms of Endearment recently with my girls (students at the Oprah Winfrey Leadership Academy for Girls in South Africa). I sit down with them, telling them all the movies you need to know. (She pounds her hands) Movies you ... need ... to ... know. Terms might be my favourite movie of all time other than ... well, (One Flew Over the) Cuckoo's Nest is one of my favourites.

When I first opened my school, I made everyone watch The Wizard of Oz, and they were like, "Mom O, why are we watching this white girl run up some yellow bricks?' That's when they were 12 or 13. Now they get it. Because I teach, "You've always had the power. You spend your whole life running around, looking for the perfect yellow brick road and it's always right here." Now they're college graduates. We were just talking about this the other day. "Remember when you made us watch The Wizard of Oz? " What was that all about?

Same thing when I first showed To Kill a Mockingbird to my kids. "It's in black and white? Nooooo!"

What's your favourite line in that movie? Come on. Tell me!

Uuummm...

"Stand up. Your father's passing." Still gets me every time!

I normally don't watch movies more than once. That one I probably saw three or four times as a little girl. Scout. Why didn't someone name me Scout? I just love the idea of being a Scout. You can never be mad at a Scout, you know. -Los Angeles Times/TNS


Area 53 Director Shainy Kabeer thanked the clubs for their support and awarded them with a

How Pixar put fresh tyres on its franchise

n Hollywood, as it is everywhere, noone escapes from the ravages of time. Not the beautiful people who walk the red carpets. Not the power players who pull the strings in the executive suites. And evidently not even the animated talking cars.

In Disney/Pixar's Cars 3, in theatres Friday, the hard-charging race car Lightning McQueen (voiced by Owen Wilson) finds himself grappling with the automotive version of a midlife crisis as a younger, faster car named Jackson Storm (Armie Hammer) emerges on the racing scene and threatens to force him into involuntary retirement. With the help of a plucky, tech-savvy young trainer named Cruz Ramirez (Cristela Alonzo), Lightning tries to get his mojo back.

Middle-age angst may seem like an unusual plot driver for a kids' movie whose core audience is still in elementary school. Even Wilson admits it took him by surprise at first.

"I was like, 'Wow, even my animated characters — they're making them get older?'" the actor, 49, says with a laugh. "I'm aware that, as an actor, you're probably not doing romantic comedies or buddy comedies as much in your late 40s as you would in your early 30s. But I thought this one was kind of safe."

With the *Cars* franchise itself now over a decade old, though, this grown-up-oriented story line offers a way for the series to appeal to both parents and to the kids who fell in love with the first *Cars* movie in 2006, many of whom are now approaching adulthood themselves. At the same time, Pixar and Disney are working hard to cultivate a new generation of *Cars* fans — and, in particular, bring more young girls into the fold with the introduction of a major female character in Cruz.

Pixar has never shied away from incorporating grown-up themes into its

films, of course, whether it's the fear of mortality in *Toy Story 3*, parental anxiety in *Finding Nemo* or environmental destruction in *Wall-E*.

Indeed, the animation studio plumbed the indignities of middle age once before in its 2004 film *The Incredibles*, which centres on a pair of married superheroes in the suburbs trying to adjust to the sometimes spirit-crushing struggles of work and parenting.

"We really don't make our movies for a particular age group or gender — we truly make them for everybody," says John Lasseter, chief executive of Pixar Animation Studios and Walt Disney Animation Studios, who directed the first two *Cars* films. "If someone is breathing, they're our target. That's my philosophy."

Lasseter says the initial inspiration for McQueen's emotional journey in *Cars 3* – which sees him transition from hotshot racing champion to elder statesman and mentor – came from his friendship with NASCAR racer Jeff Gordon, who announced his retirement from the sport in 2015 at age 43.

"In the last few years of his racing career, Jeff would talk to me a lot about the young drivers coming in," Lasseter says. "There was this energy they had and he realised, 'That's the way I was when I was younger.' I started thinking, 'Well, that could be where Lightning McQueen is at."

That said, *Cars* has proven a particularly potent series with very young kids and, as *Cars 3* director Brian Fee acknowledges, kids don't, as a general rule, suffer from midlife crises.

"Hopefully they don't," Fee, making his feature directorial debut, says with a laugh. "But while kids don't understand midlife

crisis, they do understand that McQueen can't race anymore. They do understand the thing they want to see, the thing that makes their favourite character happy, is something that he can't do anymore."

The power of the franchise's appeal to young kids - and especially boys - is

evidenced by the merchandising bonanza it has spawned over the years, which rivals those of juggernauts like *Harry Potter*, *Star Wars* and Pixar's own *Toy Story*.

Though the first two *Cars* films are only the 10th- and 15th-highest-grossing Pixar movies at the domestic box office, respectively, and have not been as widely embraced by critics as many of the animation studio's other films, they have powered a booming industry in everything from Carsbranded toys to school supplies to apparel to bedding to video games. In just the first five years after the release

In just the first five years after the release of *Cars*, the franchise generated \$10 billion in global retail sales. In 2012, Disney opened Cars Land at its California Adventure theme park to further capitalise on the appetite for all things *Cars*.

But while a beast of that size clearly needs to be continually fed, Fee says he did his best to tune it out while making the film.

"I don't think or care about merchandise," he says. "The thing is, if we make a good film, that machine will have whatever it needs to keep going. But it's all about the movie for me. If any kid is carrying around a backpack or holding a toy, that's hopefully because they like the story and the characters — not the other way around."

"John Lasseter loves all the toys, all the merchandise – he's such a perfectionist about making sure they're the best and coolest products possible," says Cars 3 producer Kevin Reher. "But it's Brian's job to tell the story."

Though Lasseter himself has had a deep passion for cars since boyhood, he says that from the earliest days of the *Cars* franchise he tried to make something that could appeal to anyone, regardless of their level of interest in cars or their gender.

"When I was working on the first one, my wife, Nancy, said, 'You can't make this movie just for yourself and your car-geek buddies you've got to make it for me and your nieces and people who aren't into cars,'" he recalls. "Through the whole first movie, it became what was known as 'the Nancy factor.' There are young boys that really love Lightning McQueen, but there are a lot of girls that love him too. It was a conscious decision to make him red — it's not the typically quoteunquote 'boy colour.'"

With the introduction of Cruz Ramirez, Pixar is clearly hoping to rev up the series' appeal to girls a few more notches. In advance of the movie's release, Disney's online store has been stocked with T-shirts for girls and women emblazoned with the character's name and the words "My Way or the Highway."

Fee says he hopes the character — who set aside her racing ambitions because she didn't see any other female cars on the track — will inspire young girls like his own two daughters to not hold themselves back from pursuing their dreams.

"I'm really hoping kids see themselves in Cruz," Fee says. "My daughters didn't want to learn to play guitar because they decided guitar is just a boys' thing. That broke my heart for them to say that. I'd sometimes watch them be afraid to try things because they didn't want to fail. We hope Cruz speaks for people that have felt out of place, because I think that's everybody more often than they'd probably admit."

With an *Incredibles* sequel and a fourth *Toy Story* film already in the Pixar pipeline, Lasseter suggests that the *Cars* franchise could have more gas in its tank. But for now he isn't getting ahead of himself.

"I love these characters and I love the world, and there are so many other stories that you could tell," he says. "But we don't decide that we're going to do it until we have a story that we think would make a great movie."

On some level, of course, the future of the *Cars* franchise is not entirely up to Pixar and Disney — the audience will ultimately determine how many miles end up on the odometer. To the question of how one knows when it's time to stop and retire, one character in *Cars 3* offers a blunt answer: "The youngsters will tell you." —*Los Angeles Times/*TNS

Fruit as luxury: the Japanese shop where melons cost 250 dollars

Nowhere is fruit savoured more than in Japan, where farmers put huge resources into creating the ideal growing conditions. It's not uncommon for Japanese to fork out seemingly exorbitant prices just for one perfect strawberry. By Lars Nicolaysen

"Look at that, the pattern on the surface is perfectly even," says the manager of the Senbikiya fruit shop with a beaming smile.

In some respects the round fruit is indeed a jewel, though the layman might only recognise that when he sees the price tag - 27,000 yen or around 250 dollars.

"We sell the best melons in Japan," says Hiraishi. "In other words, the best melons in the world."

Fruit is a luxury industry in Japan, and it's very lucrative. That's not to say that fruit is a rarity in the world's third largest economy. The fruit Hiraishi sells is grown in Japan, it's not imported.

At any good supermarket you can buy melons as well as strawberries. cherries, peaches, grapes and all sorts of other fruits - though the prices are perhaps a little higher

than what people in the West are

What makes it possible is Japan's culture of gift-giving. "Eighty per cent of our customers buy fruit as a gift," says Hiraishi.

The Japanese love food in general and particularly fruit, meaning that they will often give it to business partners, friends and relations as a sign of their appreciation.

Japanese food producers therefore take a lot of care with their products, as well as its

packaging. Take the example of a melon. "A melon plant normally bears about six fruit," says Hiraishi. "But with our melons the farmer cuts half off." After a time he cuts off another two and the one that's left is the one that grows "best."

That fruit gets all the plant's nutrients to itself for around 100 days. But what does "best" mean is this scenario?

If the melon is just a tiny bit "lopsided" or "bumpy" it's value immediately drops.

"The fruit has to have an even pattern, be nice and heavy and have a lovely round shape," says Hiraishi. There are other farmers who

specialise in luxury strawberries. Strawberries from Ichigo Co in the province of Niigata cost 1,000 ven (9 dollars) each. They are grown under LED lights in a special hightech, one-of-a-kind lab, in which the temperature, humidity and oxygen levels are all controlled.

That means the harvest is not weather-dependent and is unaffected by pests, meaning the farmer doesn't have to use chemicals.

You can buy Ichigo's handpicked strawberries online in sets of six, and they arrive beautifully packed in a box not unlike those used for expensive chocolates.

Senbikiya, which was founded 183 years ago, also sells its fruit in elaborate boxes and cartons.

Back then, when the shop was first set up, the produce it sold was nothing special, says Hiraishi. It was the wife of the second owner, the daughter of a trader in

katsuobushi (dried and fermented tuna) who began selling fruit as a luxury product.

The shop's main outlet can be found at one of Tokyo's best addresses, surrounded by big banks.

More than half of their customers are business clients, Hiraishi says, as he lays his melon carefully back on the shelf.

Just a few days earlier, at the first auction for this year's harvest in Hokkaido, the northernmost of Japan's islands, a pair of Yubari melons sold for 1.5 million yen (13,700 dollars).

The trader who purchased them announced that he would donate them to a primary school.

Although he didn't get a taste himself, it was still a clever public relations investment. After all, Japan's media dedicates huge coverage to stories about fruit. -DPA
